
Welcome, Anna Rodriguez

trained to run our Livestream system on Sunday mornings. This would include operating the cameras, some sound work, and monitoring the video feed during the worship service.





FUMC Finance News

Status of FUMC Pledges June 30, 2020 Carol Beaty FUMC Finance Chair

Here is the FUMC monthly report to the congregation on the status of our pledges. Average monthly pledges needed to meet our budget of \$650,000 in pledge income = \$54,166

Jan 2020 pledges - \$90,458 13.92% of annual budgeted pledges received (some members paid entire year)

Feb 2020 pledges - \$54,487 22.30% of annual budgeted pledges received March 2020 pledges - \$67,420 32.67% of annual budgeted pledges received April 2020 pledges - \$68,050 43.14% of annual budgeted pledges received May 2020 pledges - \$34,806 48.50% of annual budgeted pledges received June 2020 pledges - \$41,087 55.26% of annual budgeted pledges received

To meet our pledge income budget for the year we will need to collect \$290,819 in the next 6 months which is equivalent to \$48, 470 each of the remaining months of this year. We are increasing our monthly pledges, but it still appears that we will be short. If you are behind in your pledges, please consider catching up soon. We are hopeful that we will continue to improve and that we will have a successful fall campaign that will allow us to maintain our current staff and program budgets.

FUMC Leadership Team Discusses Continued COVID-19 Response

The leadership of FUMC discussed our continued response and building use regarding the COVID-19 crisis. We will continue our current closed policy at FUMC through August 2020. The Great Plains Annual Conference recommendations basically remain the same while allowing churches to make decisions they feel are prudent for their particular congregations in terms of in-person meetings. While we will continue to monitor governmental suggestions and our Conference information, two of our criteria for beginning to look at in-person gatherings will be a decline in the number of cases, as well as hospitals once again allowing visitors in our area. At the time of our meeting, cases continue to be trending upward and we see no indication of hospitals allowing visitors, other than on a very limited basis at two locations. We will continue to consider at least a two-week stable trend of decline of cases as well as allowing visitors to hospitals.

Along with this we will be putting together a small group to create a COVID-19 plan for when we do move toward opening the building up to in-person meetings. Of utmost importance, and our primary concern, is the health, wellbeing, and safety of our members and those who frequent our facility. It is for this reason that the leadership of FUMC has decided to continue our current policy of the church being closed, for all intents and purposes. There will be no in-person worship or gatherings in the building. The exception to this policy is that staff will be in the building part time and small committees, properly socially distanced and comfortable, will be welcomed by contact with the staff. Of course, we will continue online worship at 10:50 each Sunday. This will be the policy until the end of August. We will meet again August 20, 2020 to reexamine current virus case statistics and other measurements to assess how we move into August and beyond.

Thank you for your patience, understanding, and your commitment to and love of FUMC. We are all looking forward to that day we can be gathered together again. Until then be safe and well and know you are not alone!
