

THINK ON THESE THINGS

Philippians 4:8

At staff meeting this past week I looked around the table and said "It's Advent. How can it be Advent already?" I am still adjusting to the fact that five months have passed since we started our time together. And here we are, preparing for the first season of the church year.

I was 5 years old when my maternal grandfather died on Christmas Day. I still remember as the family gathered for the funeral an organist was playing Christmas music. The tune we know as "What Child is This?" was emanating

from an instrument I could not see. As our worship team began to think about the journey through Advent, we turned to that question, "what child is this?" We focused on 4 key elements about Jesus that speak to the relationship we seek to understand and yes, at times emulate. Sometimes the answers come through instruments we don't always see clearly or immediately.

Throughout Advent we will all consider that question. We will be asked to think of how we are influenced by a child who was transient who sometimes did not know where he would sleep at night. We will think of Jesus as a healer beyond the physical considerations. The challenges of the word "Savior." Finally Jesus as teacher who taught new ways to live and be in the world. On December 24, we see Jesus as incarnation – and each of us as incarnation of God in the world.

The question of 'what child is this' is not only about the One we celebrate at Christmas. We are, each of us, children of God who consider that question about our own lives – what child of God is this and what gifts do we have to share in the world?

I am praying we share in a holy and meaningful Advent season together. I am on the journey with you.

Thirteen "whys" LED By The Light Campaign

The climate crisis can be overwhelming to think about! We are all more than aware that the stakes are high as carbon emissions continue to climb globally. What to do? What to do?

Well, we can start in our own "backyard" as it were. First UMC has an ambitious Sustainability Master Plan that gives us steps to take to reduce our carbon emissions and strengthen our culture of creation care. We are continuing to build on improvements that have been made over the past years.



The Eco Team has launched the LED By The Light Campaign with a goal of replacing all convertible lighting units to LED by raising \$25,000 by Earth Day, April 22, 2022. LEDs emit very little heat. In comparison, incandescent bulbs release 90% of their energy as heat. LED lights typically last much longer than other lighting types. A good quality LED bulb can last 3 to 5 times longer than a CFL and 30 times longer than an incandescent bulb.

Leading by example, members of the Eco Team have personally pledged \$7,300 towards the \$25,000 goal. We are inviting members of the congregation to give in honor of loved ones, for birthdays, holidays, and other special occasions. The average cost for a commercial grade LED unit is between \$150 and \$180. Gifts in any amount will make a difference! Make checks to First UMC and write in the memo: Eco Team/LED and drop off at the office.

Eco team members Deb and Neal Ratzlaff share these words about why they are giving:

When considering where to gift monetary resources, we usually look for conservation or education projects. Neal, the nature enthusiast, and Deb, the retired teacher, have seen many deserving conservation or education projects go underfunded while acquisition, buildings, maintenance, or facilities projects usually find funding. The "LED by the Light" Campaign is different for us.

We have thirteen "whys". Their names are: Will, Sophia, Ruby, Jonny, Colette, Eli, Alena, Ray, Michael, John, Hallie, Kennedy, and Atticus. We give in their honor and for their future.

We **don't** accept any bags (plastic or compostable), animal products (except eggshells), or plastics. We **do** accept plant matter, coffee grounds, limited paper (like coffee filters, or napkins.)

FUMC Finance Report

Our stewardship theme this year is <u>Building a Culture of Generosity</u>. Thanks to so many of you who have already returned your pledge cards for 2022. The finance team is currently developing the budget for 2022 which will be presented to the Church Council at the January meeting.

Here is the FUMC monthly report to the congregation written on Nov 12, 2021.

Average monthly pledges needed to meet our budget of \$625,000 in pledge income = \$52,083

Jan 2021 pledges - \$83,029 (some members paid entire year)

13.28% of annual budgeted pledges received

Feb 2021 pledges - \$63,170 - 23.39% of annual budgeted pledges received March 2021 pledges - \$74,069 - 35.24% of annual budgeted pledges received April 2021 pledges - \$37,208 - 41.20% of annual budgeted pledges received May 2021 pledges - \$47,333 - 48.77% of annual budgeted pledges received June 2021 pledges - \$44,974 - 55.97% of annual budgeted pledges received July 2021 pledges - \$37,653 - 61.99% of annual budgeted pledges received August 2021 pledges - \$60,430.67 - 71.66% of annual budgeted pledges received September 2021 pledges - \$36,466.67-77.49% of annual budgeted pledges received October 2021 pledges - \$42,830.67 - 84.35% of annual budgeted pledges received

Thanks to everyone who is paying or exceeding their pledges. It is greatly appreciated.

As of October 31, 2021, our total income is 82.53% of what we budgeted. Our expenses are 79.49% of what we budgeted. It is expected we would be at 83.3% at this time of year. We are in good shape with both our income and expenses.

Return Service Requested

Costs, Complications and Consequences of the Voter Restriction Amendment

Members of FUMC have already been approached to sign a petition to change our Nebraska Constitution to require voters to present a government-issued ID to cast a ballot. The Salt and Light team is working with Civic Nebraska to educate the community about the costs, complications and consequences of this voter restriction amendment.

Nebraska was born during an argument over voting rights. As a result, it has arguably the clearest and most powerful language of any state Constitution about ensuring our elections are free and fair, without unnecessary hindrances: All elections shall be free; and there shall be no hindrance or impediment to the right of a qualified voter to exercise the elective franchise. This clear, fundamental right is now in clear danger. We can say confidently that Nebraska's elections are secure and efficient, and there is no evidence of voter impersonation anywhere in our state, ever. (Source: Civic Nebraska)


Changing our state's Constitution is a big deal with long lasting consequences. Election officials have publicly stated that our elections in 2020 ran smoothly. The only thing a constitutional amendment would do is restrict voting.

Part of our United Methodist discipleship includes being active participants in political systems.

Our United Methodist Social Principles state: The strength of a political system depends upon the full and willing participation of its citizens. The church should continually exert a strong ethical influence upon the state, supporting policies and programs deemed to be just and opposing policies and programs that are unjust.
