THINK ON THESE THINGS

Philippians 4:8

I remember in the church of my childhood, we participated each year in a Lenten offering. The church staff handed out folders with 40 open slots, one for each day of Lent. Adults used the folder that held quarters, kids used the folder that held dimes. At the bottom there was a larger space with room for folded bills, a check, something a little more. If I remember

correctly the offering was to be used for missions.

The idea of giving something each day was intended to bring us to a place of thinking about what we have, what we can share, even to consider sacrifice. I remember my Dad going to the bank and getting a roll of quarters and filling in the folder the Monday after we brought it home on Sunday. Kind of a 'well, we're done with that' attitude. Now don't get me wrong, my Dad was very intentional about our giving to the church, the first check each month was written and placed in the offering plate. But the folder apparently wasn't something that called to him. I remember other people returning it on Easter Sunday with a kind of reverential attitude and for them, \$10 in a folder might have been all they could give.

I would not pretend to believe that the exact same practice during the season of Lent speaks to each person in the same way. I do encourage you, though, to take on *something* during these 40 days. We often talk about what we give up and that's important if what you give up is something that is keeping you from living faithfully. I also encourage all of us to <u>take on</u> a spiritual habit that enhances our journey through Lent. Journaling, prayer in a new way, reading the Bible, joining in the discussion of "The Gifts of Imperfection," working at a food bank, calling legislators about important bills, the list is endless. Open your heart and mind to the holiness of the season before us.

On January 31, I had my interview with the Board of Ordained Ministry (BoOM) to request provisional membership in the Great Plains Conference. I am also excited about our Lenten series on *The Gifts of Imperfection*. The Lenten season is always one where I seek to renew my faith and prepare my heart for the joy of Easter morning. I feel there are a lot of new opportunities springing up. While things might be different it also means there are endless possibilities for what might take place. As I embrace the change of being commissioned in the United Methodist Church, may we each embrace the newness, trusting God is guiding us with every step.



Godspell March 18-26

Résonance, Omaha's premier professional vocal ensemble, continues its tenth anniversary season with the highly anticipated fully staged musical story of Stephen Schwartz's *Godspell* told at First United Methodist Church.

The musical is a timeless tale of friendship, loyalty and love based on the Gospel According to St. Matthew. The 2012 edition is a retelling of the original sensation, injected with contemporary references and dazzling new arrangements. The work was the first major musical theatre offering from three-time Grammy and Academy Award winner, Stephen Schwartz (Wicked, Pippin, Children of Eden); and it took the world by storm. Led by the international hit, "Day by Day," Godspell features a parade of beloved songs, including "Prepare Ye the Way of the Lord," "Learn Your Lessons Well," "All for the Best," "All Good Gifts," "Turn Back, O Man" and "By My Side."

Playing the role of 'Jesus' is singer and composer J. Isaiah Smith, known for lead roles in Ragtime and Singing in the Rain (Omaha Community Playhouse). Additional cast includes Jon Gathje (King Kaspar, Amahl and the Night Visitors) in the dual role of John the Baptist and Judas, with John Celesky, Tara Cowherd, Jonathan Frazier, Janeen Jensen, CeCe Hastreiter, Beth Leona King, Lauren Morrissey, Megan Parsons and Evan Wohlers as his followers.

Joining the followers are members of Résonance and the Youth Ensemble together with the Chancel Choir from First United Methodist Church, all led by music director Mark Kurtz.

Broadway star (Glinda, Wicked) and accomplished author (Waiting in the Wings) Tiffany Haas returns to Omaha to direct the ensemble cast, in collaboration with associate stage director, Fran Sillau. "Being able to share this story with the community, in a place of worship, is unique...," shares Haas.

During her residency, Tiffany will also engage in masterclasses with Omaha Public Schools students at North Omaha Music and Arts, and perform the music of Stephen Schwartz in a special fundraiser concert to support the organization's education and immersion programs on Sunday, March 19, at 5:30 pm at First United Methodist Church, in the commons.

Résonance performs five performances of Stephen Schwartz's GODSPELL (2012) on Friday and Saturday at 7:30 pm and Sunday at 2:00 pm, March 18 through 26.

The collaboration with First United Methodist Church is highlighted in the Résonance tenth anniversary season. The church has a long history of collaboration with the organization and has hosted the ensemble in a number of performances over the years. "Our community is so delighted to host this performance and offer this community the unique telling of Jesus and his followers, as they share the meanings of love, acceptance, sacrifice, and forgiveness...," shares Senior Pastor Morita Truman. The church is neighbors to Lewis and Clark Middle School (OPS) and is offering this performance to all students at no cost.

The musical performance is available at various price ranges, starting at \$10. Those with a student ID are free. Tickets are available at the door; advanced ticket reservation is encouraged. 
We hope that members will take advantage of the various nonpartisan advocacy groups that can provide up-to-date information on bills and ways to advocate for and against. Some of those groups are:

FUMC Finance Report Carol Beaty, FUMC Finance Chair

Here is the FUMC monthly report to the congregation written on Feb 22, 2023.

Average monthly pledges needed to meet our budget of \$650,000 in pledge income = \$44,862

Jan 2023 pledges - \$156,519.17 (some members paid entire year) 24.0% of annual budgeted pledges received.

As of Jan 30, 2023, our total income is 20.28% of what we budgeted. Our expenses are 8.264% of what we budgeted. We would expect income and expenses to be at 8.33% at this time of the year.

Report from Immigration & Refugee Action Team (IRAT)

June 24, 2019 was a momentous day in the life of Pehr Say and Ro May. They arrived in Omaha after leaving a refugee camp in Thailand, first taking a bus to Bangkok, then planes to Hong Kong, Los Angeles, and finally to Omaha. It was a tiring three-day journey before arriving in Omaha to begin a new life. Their home

is in an apartment complex north of 66th and Ames where many refugee families live.

Although born in Myanmar, formerly known as Burma, they are of the Karen (Kah-Ren) group. They fled from Myanmar to safety due to civil war fighting, met in the camp, and have been married for 15 years. Their son, Shae Tha Say Ro, a seventh grader, and daughter El Eh Say Ro, a second grader, are students at St. Cecilia Cathedral School. Their son, Alexander Say Ro, was born in Omaha on December 23, 2021.

Pehr Say's parents are still living in Myanmar and she has a sister who lives in Australia. Ro May has two sisters who live in Omaha and a brother who would like to come to America, but needs a sponsor in order to do so. He is employed at Airlite Plastics in Carter Lake, Iowa, and is taking classes in English on Monday and Wednesday evenings at Metropolitan Community College. We welcome them to America and to our city.
