On April 16, 9 of the 13 stood before the church and vowed to participate in the life and ministries of First. What we didn't say was "confirmation is over." All our lives are a journey of confirming what we believe, what we know, what we question, who we question, how we act, where we act. We never stop learning and discerning where God is leading us. We never stop confirming what it is we believe and how we share that with the world. With these young people, with all of you, it's a privilege to be on the journey together.

I hope you get to know all of our confirmation participants - to learn what makes each of them unique and special. We had siblings. We had cousins. We had 'cradle' Methodists and those who have just found their way here. Our young people are a beautiful rainbow of abilities and faith and we are blessed to have them.

Welcoming

God's Love Has No Borders



In mid-March, I traveled to McAllen Texas with a group of 35 clergy and laity from the Great Plains Annual Conference (Nebraska and Kansas). The purpose of the trip was to learn about the realities immigrants and people living at the United States-Mexico border face. Our four days were packed with information, from meeting border patrol agents to learn about the work they do, to meeting with an organization called La Posada who houses immigrants as they await jobs, placements, or changes in their immigration status. We

also worshiped at El Buen Pastor in Edinburg, Texas where we were welcomed with delicious tamales. We also got to spend a day in Mexico visiting some of the United Methodist ministries in the area.

One impactful moment was going to part of the border wall and writing with chalk on the wall. This portion of the wall separated Texas from Texas. Witnessing this reality made me think more about the border wall and call into question: is this for security or is this to instill fear in others? One line we continued to use on the trip is "God's love has no borders." This simple reminder is what I hope we continue to achieve in our churches and world. To break down the borders of our own hearts and learn to love one another more authentically. I found being with a diverse group of people from the Great Plains made me hopeful for the future of the church as we work to make everyone feel welcome. How will you continue to show "God's love has no borders?"

Update From the Legislature



FUMC members have been actively contacting our state senators urging them to NOT support bills that harm women, children and youth. Among the hundreds of bills, there are ones to consider supporting. Your voice is important! The following bills are related to public education in Nebraska. To learn more about current bills that can affect public education, go to https://www.nsea.org/action. Contact your state senator with a request to support either or both of these bills. To contact your state senator, go to: ne-braskalegislature.gov The last scheduled day for this session is June 9th.

LB 585 amends current law for the purposes of providing schools greater flexibility in providing more comprehensive behavioral and mental health training that focuses on suicide awareness and prevention, which is required annually.

LB 630 directs the State Department of Education to develop a model dress code and grooming policy that facilitates an inclusive and positive learning environment while complying with any applicable health or safety law, rule, regulation, ordinance, or resolution. Such model policy shall not: target, disproportionately impact, discriminate, or be applied in a discriminatory manner against any students on the basis of race, religion, sex, disability, or national origin. Nor shall such policy prohibit a student from wearing attire, including religious attire, natural and protective hairstyles, adornments or other characteristics associated with race, national origin, or religion; or require a student's hair be permanently or temporarily altered.






Immigration News

First United Methodist Church has been involved in providing food boxes to refugee families, shelters, and halfway houses for many years. The boxes are prepared every Wednesday and Sunday of the year from produce donated by Whole Foods and organized through Community Produce Rescue. Dave Dow, who picks up the food on Wednesdays, has been involved in this project for almost eight years and Karlene and Dennis Kingery have helped him sort it for over five years. The three of them also deliver the boxes on Wednesdays.

Receiving food on Wednesdays are four Karen families, one each from Guatemala and South Sudan, a family from Mexico seeking asylum sponsored by the OASN (Omaha Area Sanctuary Network), one to Carole's House of Hope, and one to an Afghan family of 10, sponsored by St. Pius X Church. On Sunday, another group sorts food and a box is delivered by Sue and Alan Shuler to an Afghan family that First United Methodist sponsors, one by Dave to Carole's House of Hope, and several to other groups and organizations.

- For adults the cost is \$1800 for a double occupancy room, \$2300 for a single. This fee includes transportation, hotel w/breakfast, fees paid to all venues and tour stops. It does not include lunch and dinner.

In the words of Preston Love, Jr., tour founder and director, "The focus is to teach inspire, and educate African American history and experience, to transform participants through the experience to engage in community, and to learn history, respect history, and go make history."

News from OTOC

Thirty years ago, FUMC Omaha was a founding member of Omaha Together One Community (OTOC), a faith-based, grassroots organizing entity seeking to address systemic justice needs of its member institutions. Through OTOC, our institution extends its outreach and power to make a positive difference in the world. Please read below for news about OTOC's recent work.

OTOC LEADS: Nebraska Coalition to Advocate for Immigration Reform & State Investments that will Enrich, Grow and Prosper Our Communities

Omaha Together One Community (OTOC) leaders have been engaged with diverse business, agriculture, healthcare, labor, education, and immigrant leaders to advocate for meaningful immigration reform as the means to solve Nebraska's workforce shortage. We conducted almost 80 individual statewide meetings and



hosted nearly 200 leaders at five large group meetings on this issue in Nebraska during 2022. Nebraska's employers and community leaders consistently said they need and will welcome immigrants looking to contribute their talents to our workforce and grow and enrich our communities. We have also heard that immigrants need certainty and to be valued in their workplaces and communities. Consistently, leaders agreed that Nebraska's workforce shortage will be solved only with meaningful immigration reform, and we need a broad-based coalition to meet that challenge.

After an exciting opportunity to share our work with U.S. Secretary of Labor, Marty Walsh, in Lincoln he said enthusiastically, "I want to applaud you on this because I've never seen this kind of a coalition anywhere else in the whole country!" Sec. Walsh also validated the strength of an "economic strategy" and advised us to "go big" on immigration reform.

We are now convening four workgroups (state, federal, public relations, legislative) which will consist of a diverse team of leaders working to identify, research, and propose specific strategies which will be reviewed by a Steering Committee composed of organizational leaders. We anticipate a state-wide full throttle effort emerging from this common agenda in 2023.

FUMC Finance News

FUMC Finance Report Carol Beaty, FUMC Finance Chair

Here is the FUMC monthly report to the congregation written on April 15, 2023.

Average monthly pledges needed to meet our budget of \$650,000 in pledge income = \$43,765

Jan 2023 pledges - \$156,519.17 (some members paid entire year) 24.0% of annual budgeted pledges received.

Feb 2023 pledges - \$55,835 (some members paid entire year) 31.98% of annual budgeted pledges received

Mar 2023 pledges - \$39,070.17 (some members paid entire year) 38.68% of annual budgeted pledges received

As of March 31, 2022, our total income is 35.63% of what we budgeted. Our expenses are 24.51% of what we budgeted. We would expect income and expenses to be at 25% at this time of the year. Our income is higher because of prepaid pledges. Our expenses are close to expectations.

On April 11, The Church Council approved a revised budget. A new line item for our cleaning service as added to the budget. The amount for 2023 is \$40,000. The \$40,000 was subtracted from the compensation budget for part-time custodians. The overall budget totals were unchanged from the budget approved in January.
