THINK ON THESE THINGS

Philippians 4:8

At the beginning of August, I did something I have never done in my ministerial career — I was gone for consecutive Sundays. It was a strange experience for me. I was in an airport on the second Sunday and heard an announcement that a Catholic mass was available and I wondered if I should offer to set up a Protestant service somewhere in the

terminal. In the meantime, it was a gift knowing that our associate Maddi Baugous had Sunday mornings well in hand. I know her messages were a blessing.

My vacation wasn't quite what I expected. I celebrated birthdays and baptisms with my two great-greats and had time with family but the hospitalization of another family member changed the tone. I spent a lot of time doing pastoral care with my family. Did laundry, cooked, and cleaned. Took out recycling. Made a veggie tray for a birthday party. Babysat with the most adorable 1-year-old. Provided transportation. Fed a cat and emptied a litter box. Waited in the hospital. Listened to a 3-year-old talk about dinosaurs. Said thank you.

Why this report of my time away? This month our church's Time and Talent card comes into your homes. It is the beginning of our stewardship program that takes place each fall. On the card you will see a list of some of the ways we share in ministry at First Omaha. You don't have to check everything, but check *something*. Pray about the gifts you have to share, the gifts and talents you possess, and indicate your willingness to do something more. If there is something you think of that's not listed, indicate that on the line that says "other." My list above is hopefully a reminder that ministry comes in many ways. God works through us in the ways we make ourselves available.

Being the church together requires all of us. Our membership vow is to support the church with our prayers, presence, gifts, and service. That may take us out of our comfort zones, but even better it takes us into a holy zone of reaching out, of being Matthew 25 people: Jesus says when you did these things for any of my siblings, you did it for me.

Paid Sick Leave for Nebraskans

FUMC, as a member of OTOC, has joined a coalition of organizations and advocates to start a ballot initiative campaign to guarantee that all Nebraska workers can accrue paid sick leave. The United Methodist Social Principles state, "We support measures that limit the length of both the workday and workweek and endorse policies that guarantee every worker paid time off, including but not limited to sick time..."



In Nebraska 35.5% of employers provide no paid sick leave for fulltime employees. 86.4% of part-time employees have no paid sick leave. More than 95% of job seekers indicate that paid sick leave is at least somewhat important when weighing benefits.

Policy Details:

The paid sick leave policy would require employers with less than 20 employees to allow their employees to accrue up to 40 hours of paid sick leave in a year and employers with more than 20 employees must allow accrual of up to 56 hours of paid sick leave in a year. Part-time employees would earn 1 hour of sick leave for every 30 hours worked.

Mental and physical health needs are covered and taking leave to care for someone else is protected too.

There are strong protections against a business punishing an employee for using their sick leave (threatening their job, deducing points, writing them up, etc). This signature collection runs from now until July of 2024.

We will need full participation. Over the next weeks, in the Gathering Place, we will have sheets for your ballot signature, and sheets to volunteer for signature collections. There will be a training on signature collection on Tuesday, August 29, at 6:30 pm in the Gathering Place.

FUMC 2024 Commitment Campaign

It all starts with God's generosity, God's generosity to and in the world, to and in us. "In the beginning, God created the heavens and the earth..." Christians, and others, are called to reflect on God's generosity and how that generosity has affected our lives. A common response to generosity is gratitude, defined as a feeling of appreciation by a recipient of another's kindness. A common response when feeling gratitude is



being more generous. Gratitude and generosity are interconnected – one leads to the other – they are cyclical. Gratitude comes from a place of abundance, and leads to generosity from a place of abundance.

The theme of our First United Methodist Church (FUMC) 2024 Commitment Campaign is Gratitude & Generosity. We hope to focus on all we are grateful for at FUMC in this campaign (our staff, vision, inclusion, missions, worship, education, children and youth, outreach, music, and hospitality). Our focus is also on how we can respond generously to support all of those ministries.

Archives Notes

Several people have asked me who donated various items, what is the meaning of the windows, and other similar questions. In the coming months we will be publishing information on the stained glass windows in this church as well as other religious symbols you may or may not have seen around the church.

It was the conscious decision of the builders of this church to not place plaques by each window or gift given. They are all on pages of the memorial book in the narthex of the sanctuary. Since then some items have been marked and almost all items have been identified and credited in the archives.

Willit Architectural Glass, most recently of Winona, Minnesota, created our windows and restored them after the tornado in 1975. (Several men came out of retirement to do that restoration). They recently closed and sent us all the files they had on our windows, contracts, communications and drawings, etc. (Originally the lancet windows in front were to be directly behind the altar).

I hope you enjoy these posts and know we are planning to eventually have all this information assembled in a small booklet in our pews. ~ Mark Schulze

Building a Culture of Generosity

This month we highlight a different kind of generosity that takes place at and through First United Methodist Church.



The North Omaha Area Health Center has selected First United

Methodist Church to be the recipient of the 2023 Community Health Legacy Award; a recognition of the church's history of addressing social justice issues. These ministries begin with our earliest memories—taking an anti-slavery stand, supporting Chief Standing Bear, providing transportation to polling locations, outreach to marginalized communities, and the collaborative work of creating OTOC (Omaha Together One Community) as a faith based coalition for community organizing. Recent collaborative endeavors include Medicaid expansion, rent reform, and advocating for policy that made payday lenders unwelcome in the community. The work continues to modern day with Covid 19 testing sites, forums on affordable housing, inclusion of the LGBTQ community, and connection and advocacy for immigrant families.

The award will be presented at the annual **Champion of Change Luncheon** on **Wednesday, September 13**, at the Scott Conference Center on the UNO campus.

FUMC Finance News

FUMC Finance Report

Here is the FUMC monthly report to the congregation written on August 15, 2023.

The Budget approved by the Church Council for 2023 included \$872,050 in income and \$996,681 in expenses. The budget for pledges is \$650,000. As you can see, if we have all the expenses that were budgeted, we would need to use church reserves to make up the difference. We currently have about \$350,000 in reserve.

Average monthly pledges now needed to meet our budget of \$650,000 in pledge income = \$41,366

Jan 2023 pledges - \$156,519.17 (some members paid entire year) 24.0% of annual budgeted pledges received.

Feb 2023 pledges - \$55,835 (some members paid entire year) 31.98% of annual budgeted pledges received.

Mar 2023 pledges - \$39,070.17 (some members paid entire year) 38.68% of annual budgeted pledges received.

Apr 2023 pledges - \$32,751.17 (some members paid entire year) 43.92% of annual budgeted pledges received.

May 2023 pledges - \$86,164.17 (some members paid entire year) 56.98% of annual budgeted pledges received.

June 2023 pledges - \$31,464.27 (some members paid entire year) 61.82% of annual budgeted pledges received.

July 2023 pledges - \$46,862.92 (some members paid entire year) 69.03% of annual budgeted pledges received.

As of July 30, 2023, our total income is 66.61% of what we budgeted. Our expenses are 56.40% of what we budgeted. We would expect income and expenses to be at 58.33% at this time of the year. Our income is higher because of

prepaid pledges. Our expenses are close to expectations. With the numbers listed above, we may need to rely on church reserves, but pray with the church's faithfulness that will not be necessary.
