## THINK ON THESE THINGS

Philippians 4:8

The word grace is on my mind these days. Grace is central to United Methodism, a key tenet of John Wesley's understanding of faith, that the presence of God is surrounding us even before we are aware of it, or can name it. I am writing these words on April 22, the day before General Conference 2020 is scheduled to begin in Charlotte, NC. We have a

heightened awareness of this postponed conference, it has been 5 years since the 2019 conference began the process of disaffiliations and turned the denomination to more traditional and punitive language in the Book of Discipline. I don't know what will happen in Charlotte. I am fervently praying for the delegates from around the world who have been entrusted with representing conferences, for their discernment, for courage, for stamina over the course of this 14 day event.

Grace enters when I say I am praying for all the delegates and praying for former United Methodists with whom I disagree who are traveling to Charlotte with a different set of language and intentions than I would prefer. I pray for their discernment as well, for open hearts and minds.

Grace is hard. This church has been working for full inclusion for a very long time—we pray this is the time, this is the year. It would be easy to pray for the voices of dissension toward inclusion to be quieter, kinder, absent. But that is not grace at work. Grace at First UMC is demonstrated in our ongoing commitment to be inclusive of all God's children, to hear all voices, even when we disagree.

Whatever happens in Charlotte can't and won't change that. Even if the votes don't change the language of the Book of Discipline, if we don't vote for regionalization, if we don't change the Social Principles, we will continue to engage in ministry from a place of grace.

You can get updates via the Great Plains Annual Conference website, or United Methodist News Service. We will also send updates from the church office. Above all else, pray for the Spirit of God to cover the convention center in Charlotte, pray the delegates are grace-filled, and pray for our church as we continue to minister in the world.

### FUMC ADDED OUR VOICES AND IT MADE A DIFFERENCE!!!

Whether you emailed, made calls or hand wrote postcards, your voice made a difference in the outcomes of our Nebraska legislative session! We stay centered on our Christian values of human dignity for all of God's children and because of that focus, bills we advocated for and passed include: LB 840, which requires cities to develop a five-year poverty elimination plan; passed and awaiting governor's signature; LB 20, which eliminates the two-year waiting period for restoration of voting rights to felons who have completed their sentence, probation or parole; passed and awaiting governor's signature; LB 952; required Nebraska to take advantage of federal dollars for summer food for students, and because of pressure from Nebraskans Gov. Pillen applied for the funds. Bills we opposed include: LB 1170, which cuts back the number of weeks a person can draw unemployment benefits from 26 weeks to 16 weeks (failed to move), and LR 21, which replaces LR 14 from 2021 and serves as Nebraska's application for a convention of the states (failed to move); LB 575, "Sports and Spaces" discriminated against transgender students, the bill failed on a cloture vote.

Although our legislative session has concluded, there are still opportunities for you to make a difference for reproductive health! If you would like to join FUMC friends to help with a *Protect our Rights* petition signing




### FROM THE STAFF PARISH RELATIONS COMMITTEE:

It is with joy and great anticipation that we announce to you we have offered Elizabeth Emis, "Liz" the position as our new minister of Education for First United Methodist Church. Liz sent her resume to us in late February, the Staff Parish Committee interviewed her via zoom, and this decision was made following a time of prayer and discernment. As of late Thursday night (April 25) she has accepted the position.

Liz and her family, husband John and sons Jackson and William, were present with us at First in April. They attended worship, participated in the Forum about General Conference, and shared a brunch with the SPRC and church leaders. It is a good match and SPRC believes Liz will be an excellent addition to our church staff.

Liz is currently a certified candidate who will be transferring her process from the Arkansas Conference. She will complete seminary at Garrett next summer and hopes to be commissioned as a provisional deacon at the Great Plains Annual Conference in 2025.

Due to summer commitments in her current position, Liz will join our staff on August 1. Please be in prayer for this time of transition, for the team building of our staff here, and for the ongoing growth and opportunity we see before us. We will properly welcome the Emis family in August!









### **Building a Culture of Generosity**

In January of this year we had 4 separate pipe breaks in our heating system. The specific area of the building that had the most damage was the East hallway, rooms 101-109, which houses our preschool and other meeting spaces. We have been able to replace flooring that needed to be replaced, paint walls, and take out a wall that will allow for one larger room in the preschool.

Although the boilers have been replaced in the last 70 years, we discovered the pipes that deliver the hot (and cold) water for heating throughout the building are in locations that make it difficult to find and repair (under the floors and encased in plaster walls). We are currently working with a company to replace the HVAC in that portion of the building. Yes, it will be expensive. Yes, it is necessary—we can't have a preschool without working heat.

We are able to explore this option because of the faithfulness of those who have gone before us, who entrusted funds to the First UMC Foundation in their estates and others who make contributions to the Foundation as part of their regular giving. Thanks to their vision and understanding of what needs might come, we can move ahead in confidence with this important maintenance work. What a beautiful reminder of what generosity can make

### **FUMC Finance Report**

### Carol Beaty, FUMC Finance Chair

Here is the FUMC monthly report to the congregation written on Apr 15, 2024.

The Budget approved by the Church Council for 2024 included \$905,310 in income and \$930,919 in expenses. You can see if we have all the expenses that were budgeted, we will have to use church reserves to make up the difference. The budget for pledges is \$700,000, an increase of \$50,000 over 2023. Thanks to all our generous pledgers.

Average monthly pledges needed to meet our budget of \$700,000 in pledge income = \$43,218

Jan 2024 pledges - \$223,757 (some members paid entire year) 32.0% of annual budgeted pledges received.

Feb 2024 pledges - \$34,467 (some members paid entire year) 36.89% of annual budgeted pledges received.

March 2024 pledges - \$52,812 (some members paid entire year) 44.43% of annual budgeted pledges received.

As of March 31, 2024, our total income is 40.84% of what we budgeted. Our expenses are 23.69% of what we budgeted. We would expect income and expenses to be at 25% at this time of the year. Our income is higher because of prepaid pledges. Our expenses are close to expectations.
