THINK ON THESE THINGS

Philippians 4:8

Lately I keep returning to the theme of time. So much has happened since January 1, with our building, new members, ministries that take us into the community, upcoming outreach events, I could go on and on, and we are just now coming to the midway point of the

year!

However, for today I am especially thinking about the 5 years that have passed since the special session of General Conference held in 2019. I remember my feeling of desperation that our denomination could make the decisions that extended hurtful language, becoming even more restrictive in some of its rulings. I remember being with a congregation I had worked with to be accepting of the One Church Plan, then trying to maintain a sense of calm when on the inside I was wondering how I could stay United Methodist. And then Covid descended, delaying the General Conference that was scheduled for 2020 that I hoped would "fix things."

As difficult as these years have been, with the benefit of 20/20 hindsight I've come to see the value of using that time to work on education and next steps. The additional time provided opportunity to partner, and be in conversation, with people in places that were being misrepresented. Our friends at Mainstream UMC and Reconciling Ministries Network, along with individuals and churches, have used the time since 2019 to work together for change. And here we are in 2024 with those changes now voted and acted upon, a new day in the United Methodist Church. While the time was difficult and did not pass quickly, something amazing has happened that opens even more doors and opportunities for us to be the church.

I don't like waiting. This time in particular was difficult. But I see now the fruition of the work that was done while we waited, while time was passing by and I am reminded of the ancient words 'for everything there is a season.' I like this new season we have waited and worked for — let us continue to work together, listen to one another, and work for the inclusion of all God's children in this church.



Voting is important but it's not enough this time!

Our FUMC faith community has a very high rate of people voting in every election! Pat yourself on the back if you take this responsibility seriously and show up in all election cycles!! We are in a time when the consequences of an election have never been greater. For many the decisions to be made are between democracy and facism.

The Salt and Light team urges every adult member of our congregation to find ways in which you can encourage others to register to vote and to vote in November! You may be shy, you may not



be comfortable knocking on doors, phone banking may not be at the top of your list for entertainment BUT these next five months are the windows of time that we have to make a difference for the future of our children and grandchildren!

Among the many critical issues on the ballot is reproductive health. Salt and Light member, Kate Fiandt, shares why this issue is so important! I would have never believed in the last 5 decades that we (women) would LOSE the hard earned right to choose when to have children, but that has happened. As a young woman, prior to Roe vs Wade, I saw women forced into unwanted marriages due to unplanned pregnancy and I saw ways the social system worked for women lucky to be born to the right family. During my time in the military I saw women with unplanned pregnancies getting "D and C" and women in college with me getting a weekend in Puerto Rico for an abortion. And then the women who made the tragic choice to have backroom abortions who bled to death or had life threatening infections.

We do not want to go back to those days, or worse, if we are denied access to contraception.

So, many of us are committed to vote! Now we need to help others use their voices for democracy, reproductive health, the climate, public education and more. There are a myriad of ways in which each person can impact others. Please consider stepping out of your comfort zone and becoming more involved!

ECO TEAM

Did you know that FUMC has a beautiful pollinator garden? It surrounds the gazebo and is filled with plants that bloom and benefit our little pollinator friends. You should go take a look. Try to find some of the insects that surround the gazebo, too (and it is a lot more than just bees.)

According to the USDA, "about 35 percent of the world's food crops depend on animal pollinators to reproduce" (insects are in the animal kingdom, as are bats who pollinate, too). That means about one out of every three bites of food you eat is pollinated food. Dandelions are about the first pollinator plant out in the spring and they are edible.





The diversity of plants in the pollinator garden means that there are early bloomers, mid summer bloomers and late bloomers, giving pollinators a continuous supply of nectar. And because most of them are Nebraska native plants, they are resistant to pests and disease.

You, too, can enable pollinators by planting native bloomers, like goldenrod, coneflowers, milkweed or more around your property or an apartment deck. Nurseries and Benson Plant Rescue have more Nebraska native pollinator plants.

SUMMER SUNDAY SCHOOL FOR CHILDREN

Cass' Candidacy Corner

The path to ordained ministry is a long, but necessary, one with many steps along the journey. The Candidacy Summit in January was a jumping off point to mentorship and group discernment. I've had to complete psychological evaluations, peer evaluations, and background checks as well as write several papers explaining my call and discernment process. Next, I interviewed with our SPRC (Staff Parish Relations Committee) on April 25th, and when I passed my interview, the congregation took a vote during a special Church Conference on May 7th. It was a unanimous "YES."

All my testing and checks came back so my final step to become a certified candidate is to interview with the District Committee on Ordained Ministry (DCOOM). That interview will take place in the fall around the time I begin school at UNO to complete my bachelor's in religious studies.

My deepest gratitude to all in this space who have nurtured my healing and growth since I became a member in 2015. You showed me what it looked like to walk the path of Christ in action. You took my family in your hearts and have shown us safety and love. You gave my calling a space to be heard, and for that I am forever grateful. ~ Cass Opal





Building a Culture of Generosity

Every Sunday there are multiple ways of giving that take place in our worship services and beyond. The offering plates are passed during each service. There are offering envelopes used and other people drop in checks or cash. Others offer a card stating "I give electronically." Some scan the QR code to make donations to the church budget, to special offerings like tornado relief or Peace with Justice Sunday. There are people who have automatic withdrawals set up with their banks, others who make instructions for IRA contributions at a roll-over season. Children and youth share from their own allowance funds. AND don't forget...

Choir members sing. Ushers and communion stewards aid in worship. Musicians help us sing and feel God's

presence. Teachers lead classes. Members of finance come and count the offering. Those who desire a time of fellowship share conversation over coffee and donuts (that someone picked up on their way to the building). The Mow Crew comes and takes care of the grounds. Volunteers are at the front desk answering the phone, opening doors, proof-reading publications. The craft group is making cards, Stitchin' Sisters gather to work on projects. Our

FUMC Finance Report

Here is the FUMC monthly report to the congregation written on May 15, 2024.

The Budget approved by the Church Council for 2024 included \$905,310 in income and \$930,919 in expenses. As you can see, if we have all the expenses that were budgeted, we will have to use church reserves to make up the difference. The budget for pledges is \$700,000, an increase of \$50,000 over 2023. Thanks to all our generous pledgers, to all who give

Average monthly pledges needed to meet our budget of \$700,000 in pledge income = \$42,610

Jan 2024 pledges - \$223,757 (some members paid entire year) 32.0% of annual budgeted pledges received.

Feb 2024 pledges - \$34,467 (some members paid entire year) 36.89% of annual budgeted pledges received.

March 2024 pledges - \$52,812 (some members paid entire year) 44.43% of annual budgeted pledges received.

April 2024 pledges - \$48,084 (some members paid entire year) 51.30% of annual budgeted pledges received.

As of April 30, 2024, our total income is 48.66% of what we budgeted. Our expenses are 32.49% of what we budgeted. We would expect income and expenses to be at 33.33% at this time of the year. Our income is higher because of prepaid pledges. Our expenses are close to expectations.
