THINK ON THESE THINGS Philippians 4:8

As I sit down at a keyboard to write these words, I am watching two systems in the Atlantic continue to move westward. I am in an area now under a coastal flooding watch. In the last 12 hours two storm systems have been named. I don't think I'm in Nebraska any longer!

While away visiting family, I remember things that require me to consider the vocabulary I use, my preparedness during storms, and

awareness of ways to get away from the coast. Those are things I take for granted when I am at home, well maybe not the coastal part.

Learning a new way — as we enter into our annual stewardship campaign that is focused on Generosity and Gratitude, we consider the meaning of those words and how we live them out in our faith lives. The first phase is already in your hands, the Time and Talent cards. The simple thing to do would be to check the boxes of things you are already doing, thinking to oneself, "I know I can do that." But I invite you this year to stop and consider what more you might do. I want to give you some examples...

- With the renewal of the children's area that has been happening, we have had lots of people helping to prepare rooms, or who have said "I could help on Sunday morning." They're checking new boxes.
- With the ongoing activity of our Salt and Light team leading the way
 with petitions and the Ripples of Hope program, we have had more
 people coming to the church to pray for our nation, our leaders, our
 church. They're checking new boxes.
- With our United Women in Faith group recently traveling to the Midwest Mission in Iowa to work and learn about how we can be in mission together, they came back with new ideas of what we can offer, what we can do right where we are in Omaha. They're checking new boxes.
- With the removal of harmful language in the Book of Discipline at General Conference and the openness that continues to be a part of the ministry at First UMC, we are considering all the ways we can be more inclusive with more communities in our city. There are new boxes we can still check.

The Time and Talent card goes beyond what we're doing and asks each of us "What more can I do on behalf of God in this place?"

I'm excited to see where our faith takes us.

Welcoming

RESOURCE-ful Empowerment

Last month, we kicked off our children's discussion on Identity: who are we? Are we just the sum of our parts? I love to bake, so am I a baker? Can I be a mother and a friend at the same time? Where is God in this?

These are difficult discussions for any human, and necessary to begin to realize the importance of connection. United Methodism is a spiritual movement built upon the foundation found in our Book of Discipline reminding us that "all religion is social religion; all holiness is social holiness." We are not alone, not made to be alone, and are surrounded by helpers, guiding us in our journey of discovery about ourselves and God!



Well, how do we do that? How can we feel empowered and become people empowering one another through their exploration? This is where resources become critical, and depending on one's theology(ies), we gravitate toward different resources.

There was a time in my spiritual journey where I wanted to be told who I am. I wanted to be told, "You are a Christian," or "You are a Jesus follower." I also wanted to be told exactly what that meant I should do. I wanted people to define my identity for me because the question was so daunting. It provided me great comfort when someone said, "As a Christian, you are to pray the Lord's Prayer" or "You are to read scripture daily." My shoulders relaxed when someone told me the Bible translation I "should" be using. I felt empowered, like I was living into my identity. I was comforted in the comfortable.

I was not a child, nor a youth, nor a college student. I was 28-years-old. My first marriage had ended, and I was getting to know the man who would become my husband and with whom I would create a home and nourish our two children.

At 28, I needed stability. We all crave it. Eventually though, my faith understanding no longer held up to the rigidity of the "supposed to's" I'd lovingly received. I needed to uncover my own identity with God. I discovered God had been inviting me for ages! When I gave myself the space to explore my own faith, I found a God so vibrant and in motion that no prayer, scriptural story or routine can describe fully. God cannot be boxed in, and my attempts to do so were more about my needs than God's desires for me. My resources shifted from answers-based

to process-based. I permitted myself to be uncomfortable lacking easy answers. I learned that is the essence of faith. How comforting to know discomfort is a sign of faithfulness, and God was with me – in my community – in the wondering. Talk about empowering!

The resources we offer children and families are invitations to humans gifted with questions to which there are not lasting, quick answers. Theology is a process that creates space to uncover our identity. We use books, music, games, craft materials, and play to reveal our identity from within. It's amazing to watch how confident children become when they are encouraged to focus on process rather than outcomes.



October is commitment month at FUMC. We work to get financial commitments to fund our many important ministries. FUMC has a Commitment Campaign Team that is working hard to fill our fall campaign with opportunities for spiritual growth, gratitude, and success.



The theme of our FUMC 2025 Commitment Campaign is once again Gratitude & Generosity. We hope to focus on all we are grateful for at FUMC in this campaign (our staff, vision, inclusion, missions, worship, education, children and youth, outreach, music, and hospitality). Our focus is also on how we can respond generously to support all those ministries.

The kickoff for our Commitment Campaign takes place at *a forum on Sunday, September 29 at 9:30 a.m.* in the Commons. You will have the opportunity to learn more details about the campaign, our church finances, and our budget process.

We will have lay speakers in worship who will share stories about the importance of giving. These will begin on September 29 and conclude on October 20.

We have set two goals for our Financial Commitment Campaign:

Let's have FUN this Halloween AND BE LESS SCARY FOR THE PLANET!

As we anticipate a great spooky celebration at the end of the month, everyone is encouraged to consider being more intentional about integrating our values with our actions. It may take more thought ahead of time, but being eco friendly this Halloween can be just as FUN while being KIND TO THE EARTH! You can get a lot of information about Halloween and waste online. The following is from https://hummingbirdinternational.net/facts-about-halloween-waste/.



We are not formally promoting any one organization or business, but this information can get us thinking about approaching the holiday in a greener way.

- 83% of Halloween costumes use non-recyclable plastic, equivalent to around 2000 tons of plastic waste.
- 63% of Halloween costumes can take up to 20-200 years to decompose.
- 35 million Halloween costumes are thrown away in the U.S. each year.
- Each year, the U.S. produces approximately 5.4M Kgs of textile waste from Halloween costumes.
- Halloween candy contributes to the plastic packaging waste, up to 30%.
- U.S. Americans spend around \$2.36B on plastic decorations each year that end up in landfills.

5 TIPS TO REDUCE THE WASTE:

- 1. Reuse costumes, have costume swaps, Create costumes from thrift store finds.
- 2. Eco friendly packaging and Fair Trade treats. *
- 3. Consume pumpkin: Eat your pumpkin. Make recipes to use it. Compost it. Or feed it to the animals.
- 4. Make your own decorations with repurposed materials and use again.

Building a Culture of Generosity

Here is a fact: Over the course of this year, from a cold night in January to this moment, we have had to spend some money on our facilities. That's an understatement. Four broken pipes in January caused a need for repairs, new flooring, paint, restoration of rooms, and an ongoing consideration of heating and cooling in the preschool area. The benefit is beautiful rooms, a renewed bridge of relationship between the church and the preschool, and a reminder of the need for long-term planning for the needs of a 75 year-old building. New windows have been ordered, new ceilings are being installed in areas, and carpet is being stretched or replaced in high-traffic areas. That's just some of it.

The repairs and the restoration that have taken place have been accomplished through the generosity of those who have invested in our church's Foundation. Overseen by a Board of Directors that works hand in

hand with the Board of Trustees, the Foundation monies are invested and work for us, allowing us to continue to do the work of maintaining our facility without increasing budget requests for the Trustees or dipping into our budgeted funds. It is a blessing bestowed upon us by generations who have gone before, who believed in the work of First UMC, who practiced transformative, biblical generosity. FUMC Finance Report Carol Beaty, FUMC Finance Chair

FUMC Finance Report - Carol Beaty FUMC Finance Chair

Here is the FUMC monthly report to the congregation written on Sept 15, 2024.

The Budget approved by the Church Council for 2024 included \$905,310 in income and \$930,919 in expenses. As you can see, if we have all the expenses that were budgeted, we will have to use church reserves to make up the difference. The budget for pledges is \$700,000, an increase of \$50,000 over 2023. Thanks to all our generous pledgers.

Average monthly pledges needed to meet our budget of \$700,000 in pledge income = \$39,364

Jan 2024 pledges - \$223,757 (some members paid entire year) 32.0% of annual budgeted pledges received. Feb 2024 pledges - \$34,467 (some members paid entire year) 36.89% of annual budgeted pledges received. March 2024 pledges - \$52,812 (some members paid entire year) 44.43% of annual budgeted pledges received. April 2024 pledges - \$48,084 (some members paid entire year) 51.30% of annual budgeted pledges received. May 2024 pledges - \$39,713 (some members paid entire year) 56.98% of annual budgeted pledges received. June 2024 pledges - \$51,810 (some members paid entire year) 64.38% of annual budgeted pledges received. July 2024 pledges - \$60,711 (some members paid entire year) 73.05% of annual budgeted pledges received. Aug 2024 pledges - \$36,629 77.50% of annual budgeted pledges received.

As of Aug 31, 2024, our total income is 76.64% of what we budgeted. Our expenses are 63.69% of what we budgeted. We would expect income and expenses to be at 66.67% at this time of the year. Our income is higher because of prepaid pledges. Our expenses are close to expectations.
