THINK ON THESE THINGS Philippians 4:8

I've been with my 5 year old great great nephew who is approaching his first year at a Montessori school. In a very serious conversation he sat down, looked me in the eye and asked, "Did you like kindergarten?" I had to be honest with him and tell him I didn't go to kindergarten. Oh, it existed, but my Mom didn't insist on it. I stayed out of school that year. I don't regret it, I think I'm okay, but I realized a 5 year old wasn't really asking about

that, he was asking "will I be okay with this new experience?"

Unfamiliar territory isn't easy at any age. We are hesitant about showing insecurity, we wonder if we'll "fit in" or we simply don't like the new. Road maps aren't always at the ready and in the words of ancient explorers, at times we feel like we're "marching off the map."

So what do we do? We surge forward. We keep learning, we open ourselves to new experiences, challenging lessons, moments that point out where our discomfort is located. We allow ourselves to live in the discomfort. We remember the words that appear over and over again in our faith story, "Fear not!"

I find myself thinking that we live in times that require us to move in the unfamiliar, to march off the map. Last week there was a shooting at a hospital in my home town. As I read the news accounts, I could see the location in my mind, a place I haven't lived in nearly 40 years, but still see clearly. The announcement of the detention center in McCook reminded me of the number of times I drove to the hospital there, to make visits to parishioners having knee and hip replacement surgery. My memories of the town, of the facilities are still clear in my mind. When unsettling news comes to us of places we know, of people affected and impacted, we might feel we are living in the unfamiliar.

And yet...my parents lived in the time when the power of the atom unleashed was shown in a powerful weapon. My grandparents traveled to a new land known as Oklahoma when it was opened via land runs to white citizens. Perhaps your family has stories of the Depression or the Dust Bowl. Maybe 9/11 or Columbine were moments of the unfamiliar. The financial crisis of 2008. Corporate greed such as Enron. As we live in the unfamiliar, I would encourage us to remember in every season, we turn to the words "Fear not!" and we move forward courageously in faith. We accept that we may not always know the map, we may be required to create a new one. And we walk together on this journey,

As I type this on August 20th, we are only 10 days into our Back At It! Fundraiser for WONDER-Kids Ministries. We still have 18 days remaining in the campaign. While not even halfway through the project, we have received commitments of more than \$4,000 and have received more than \$3,500 of those pledges. That is simply incredible, that a group of people is so invested in supporting growth and development. Thank you.

As a Deacon, and I guess just as part of the way I am built, I've always looked with a macro lens at the micro work happening around me. Put another way, I've always been a student of motivation: what is provoking the behavior exhibited before me? Why is what is happening, well, happening? I think this skill is, in part, cultivated a result of being a first-born child to two strategic and organized parents, one in sales and the other in healthcare. Yet I also think I lean into that skill so often because it helps me orient myself with, to, and for the world in which I live. In this role, it helps me uncover what is needed by people and systems to thrive, and then develop programs and strategies to launch them to success.

When I walk by the fundraiser board on Mondays, and make note of any additional pledges in the last week, I see more than envelopes, dollars bills, checks, and online banking transactions. I see provocation, intention, decision-making, and praxis. I see conscious choices to support children and families. And so, why are so many of you making those choices? It's because something about empowering children resonates with you. It's because somewhere in your stories, you came face to face with the reality that we all need one another.

Maybe you needed compassion, a friend, and you did not receive it. So, you are motivated by a sense of advocacy. Maybe you struggled at school and an aide or teacher committed to making sure you didn't fall behind, and you are motivated by paying it forward. Maybe you are the friend, the advocate, who came alongside someone and helped them to thriving, and that feeling of purpose, as infectious as it is, drives you.

No matter your motivation, you do the work. It's a lot like that really cool guy who lived a long time ago, the I Am that we work to emulate. He too experienced all three of these things: receiving the cold shoulder, being invested in at a young age, and investing in those around him. That's a pretty inspiring Trinity!

Our motivations influence our values. Our values should determine our ethics, our work in the world. Thank you for your ethic of investment and care. Keep living that Trinity, and may God bless you!



Building a Culture of Generosity...and a Challenge

An update on what the funds from our Foundation are allowing us to do:

- * Started installing the new piping in the North wing. A pressure test will be conducted in 2 weeks, then work will begin insulating the pipes. Hope to have the system up and running by end of September or earlier.
- * A proposed delivery date for the sanctuary air handler is the last week of October. Once that date is firm, they will start the demolition of the old air handler about the same time. The current plans would be no air movement for 2 Sundays, probably first weeks of November. Plan is to be totally finished by Thanksgiving.
- * We are considering replacing the air handlers in Mead Hall, Mead Chapel and the Parlor.
- * Investigating replacement of the kitchen in Mead Hall, to make the room more usable.
- * Adding a floor access panel in the NW corner of room 112. This area is where the supply from the boiler room enters the tunnel and is where several of the valves will be located. If work needs to be performed on the system, this was most likely the area needing to be accessed.

The generosity of members and friends who have donated to the Foundation allowed us to begin this work. At the beginning of 2026 we will invite everyone to learn more about how the Foundation works and how your faithful giving impacts this and the next generations.

FUMC Finance Report

The next scheduled meeting of the Finance Committee is September 8.

Key Financial Updates:

Revenues through July 31, 2025 were \$717,051, which is 74% of the budget to this point. We have collected 79% of our budgeted pledges. Expenses were \$577,372, or 59% of budgeted costs.

Expected revenue and expenses should be 58% of budget. We have \$306,621.50 in CDs as of July 31.

LOVE THY NEIGHBOR UPDATE

This past spring, as immigrants in the U.S. braced themselves for ICE raids, you gave \$115,000 to FUMC's "Love Thy Neighbor" fund to support those living in fear of deportation. On June 10, it happened in Omaha. ICE agents entered Glenn Valley Foods and took 74 workers into custody. Lawyers from the Center for Immigrant and Refugee Advancement (CIRA) deployed to a detention center in North Platte to provide legal counsel and try to reunite workers with their families.

Meanwhile, CIRA and other organizations stepped up to support the families back home. Here is how your donations contributed to those efforts:

\$75,000 -- Center for Immigrant and Refugee Advancement (CIRA)

Set up a flex fund to provide emergency support, including rent and utilities to families impacted by the June ICE raid. (See attached CIRA final report for details.)

\$15,000 -- Heartland Workers Center

Provided direct support to families affected by ICE raids

Safety training to prepare families for future immigration enforcement

\$4,100 -- Iglesia Comunitaria de Omaha, Spanish speaking United Methodist Church in South Omaha

Rent for an immigrant family facing eviction because of job loss

Legal fees for victims of human trafficking

\$2,800 -- AM Counseling, a bi-lingual mental health practice

Group counseling for 10-12 Spanish speaking immigrants facing mental health crises due to immigration enforcement

\$2,800 -- The Tent, UMC pantry in South Omaha that serves families whose breadwinners were detained or deported by ICE.

Purchase food for the pantry after the USDA cut off deliveries

\$300 -- Sack lunches for 100 immigrant children attending a CIRA day camp

\$100,000 of the "Love Thy Neighbor" fund has been spent. The remaining \$15,000 will soon be put to good use to help more families. As we look to the future, we pray we will continue to live out our Social Principles, not only by providing concrete support to immigrants, but also by "opposing all laws and policies that attempt to criminalize, dehumanize or punish displaced individuals and families based on their status as migrants, immigrants, and refugees."



What We Have Learned

- Larger Families Hit Hardest: Households of 5–9 people require higher support to maintain housing and services.
- Bigger Financial Gaps: Post-raid, housing and utility requests are larger on average, reflecting deeper financial insecurity.

SUCCESS STORY

Gloria* is the primary caregiver to her four children, all of whom are between the ages of 13 and 21. Gloria was detained during the Glenn Valley Foods raid on June 10th. Her four children were left behind. While Gloria has been detained, her kids faced not only having to try and figure out legal assistance for their mother, but also how they will pay their rent and utilities bills without any income coming in. The eldest child in the family had been preparing to start college this fall, but now he was looking at having to defer his enrollment to stay behind and take care of his siblings. With his mother detained and his sudden responsibility to pay rent, food, and everything else, he did not see how he could possibly leave for school. Thanks to First United Methodist Church's support, CIRA was able to cover their essential needs until the children were able to connect with extended family in California to come take care of them in the meantime. Without First United Methodist Church's support, four kids in our community would still be in crisis. Thanks to our combined help, they do not have to worry about losing their home and future opportunities.
