THINK ON THESE THINGS Philippians 4:8

I was shocked earlier today to see that someone had posted on Facebook these words, "Only 100 days til Christmas!" And this was on September 16, so it's fewer days by the time you're reading this. Actually by the time you're reading this it might be 100 days til 2026. So I better get going on all that has to happen.

One of the tasks before me is the convening of the Lay Leadership team. Previously known

as the Nominating Committee, the Lay Leadership team considers opportunities for service in the church and persons who would be amazing leaders in those positions. I choose to focus on the idea of leadership of the lay people, considering their gifts and graces, how God calls each of us into ministry and service.

My roots in ministry are deep in the work of the laity. I worked as a lay employee for 9 years at a church outside of Oklahoma City. I was consecrated as a diaconal minister — a designation in the United Methodist Church that recognized ministries of lay persons. In time diaconal ministers were invited to ordination as deacons, and at that time not everyone made the transition. Diaconal ministers who understood their work as the work of the lay person, not the ordained, retained their titles. This church has known the work of Ruth Kruse and Sue Rood as diaconal ministers.

Ministry is shared. Paul's writings to the churches in Corinth and in Rome are most notable for their designations about how every part of the body matters and the listing of work the church engages in that requires each person's gifts. But throughout the New Testament there are references to those who are doing the work. Some are named, others not, but each person is entrusted with doing what they are called to do.

That work continues through the lay leadership team. By the time you're reading this I anticipate you have received a time and talent card in your mail. I invite you to consider those opportunities, indicate where you feel God can utilize your talents, and return the card on the first Sunday in October, which is World Communion Sunday. In so doing you will join the community of saints who have kept the church moving forward for 2000 years. You ARE called. You ARE a minister of grace and ability. You ARE someone I am so grateful to be with in ministry.

On a crisp late summer Saturday morning, a bunch of kids gathered at the new Sophia's Garden play space in Lauritzen Gardens. Supported with tickets donated by our own ECO-Team, we ran through rope courses, delivered mail the traditional way, chased butterflies, and filled up watering cans to give the plants a drink.

Our WONDER-Kids fall connection event brought giggles, scampering, and full hearts. It brought joy on what could have been an otherwise everyday kind of Saturday morning. Yes, we had to get up early, and yes, our arms had goosebumps before running so much we warmed up, but it was entirely worth it. Why? Because we had church that Saturday morning. Among the birds, bugs, and buddies, we experienced prayer through play.

It made me wonder: When was the last time you played and equated the experience to worship? To prayer? To church? I don't think it is a stretch to assume that if you're reading this, you're above the age of 18. So I repeat, when

was the last time you scampered and felt truly free?

I wonder if, for many of us, it's been far too long. Sure, everyone feels liberated in different ways: dancing, writing, cooking, singing. But there is something to breathing in the outdoors and feeling the sunshine on your face, with the sounds of play all around you. It inspires you to join in.

When a child climbed up one of the garden houses, a caregiver followed, not because we worried someone could fall, but because we too were curious about what that house looked like on the inside. None of us had been to this new play space at the botanical gardens yet, and some hadn't been to the garden in several years. Our children's curiosity inspired our own. Our children gave us a path to wonder. If they can do it, surely we can.

The children led that day, even if they don't realize it. They led us to precocious, inquisitive, risky, wonder-filled joy. And if that's not the point of church, I don't know what is.

This fall, try something new, something uncomfortable, something that forces you out of your comfort zone. Ask yourself what you're curious about, what you've always wanted to try and never have, and go for it. Children lead when they demonstrate that inhibitions aren't worth holding onto when they keep you from growing. If they can do it, so can you!



"Stubborn nature of not giving up! Daily time with my Lord." These are two things that keep Judy Ashley showing up for God's beloved community!

"It may seem cliche, but I think about what Jesus did. What did he do when he came across a stranger (immigrant) or someone in need? It helps guide me in how I should act" This is how her faith guides Linda Walters.

An act of injustice that made an impression on Judy was while living in Tucson in the late '80s, her pastor came out as gay and was made to leave the church. Although this was an act of injustice, Judy remembers that the pastor did not give up on his faith and started a new church. She writes that he "never lost his joy and laughter, never gave up!"

Linda's father was very active in the Carpenter's Union so she "was exposed early to inequities in society and it is built into the fabric of who I am."

Judy's greatest concern: "the current administration systematically destroy-

ing everything good in their path." Linda's greatest concern: "Oh, there are so many! If I had to focus on one, I'm concerned about the future of many children and the opportunity gap they face. They are the future, and my concern is that many of them will not reach their full potential."

And for their hopes...for Linda: "My greatest hope is that there are people, communities, and organizations that continue to fight for justice for all. It can feel hopeless at times, but there is always someone to step up and take on the fight. For Judy: "Enough resistance to occur to stop this madness" and a belief that when "we lose something good in our lives, God always offers a new and different future."

What helps Linda cope and not give up? "Being part of this congregation doesn't let me lose hope and encourages me to push for justice and inclusion for all."

And Judy's call to all of us?..."I view Jesus as the origin of being WOKE! He taught and lived justice. Our response is to follow his example = WOKE!"

Our Salt and Light team sees these two women as signs of hope! Welcome Judy and Linda!!!







FUMC Finance Report

Kate Fiandt, Finance Chair 2025

The Finance Committee met Sept. 8, 2025. The Budget report continues to be positive; we are on budget. Kevin and Paige Wycoff are working on the Stewardship campaign. Kate Fiandt (Finance Chair) will lead a Budget Forum on Sept. 28 in the Commons between services to orient the congregation on how the budget works and our finances. This forum will help members understand the church finances and the goals of the Stewardship Campaign. Kate and Carol Beaty are meeting with church staff on the 2026 budget. A draft budget will be presented to the Finance Committee at their next meeting on Nov. 10. The committee is working closely with the Trustees and the Foundation on coordinating the capital campaign to support the major HVAC and other repairs that are in process. Please let Kevin Wycoff know if you are willing to work with them on the Stewardship campaign. Also let Kate (kfiandt@gmail.com) or Pastor Morita know if you are interested in being involved with the Finance Committee next year.

The month of August represents 2/3 of our fiscal year. Expected revenues and expenses would be 66.7%. Revenues are \$768,767 or 79% of budget. We have collected 83% of total pledges for the year. Expenses stand at \$658,491 or 67.7% of budget.

FUMC is blessed to have a healthy budget, but also our Foundation to support major expenses like the building repairs. We are committed to support the Christian mission of our faith through our work, our prayers, and our resources. Thank you for your support.
