THINK ON THESE THINGS Philippians 4:8

On November 30 we begin the season of Advent. The four Sundays prior to Christmas, this is considered the first season of the church year. Previously the liturgical color of the season was purple, which was also the color for Lent, but several years ago a transition was made to use blue to delineate the two. Advent is a season of expectation and hope, Lent a season of

repentance and introspection. Our sanctuary and church building have been adorned for the season. Right now we need this time of expectation and hope.

For our journey through this season we turn to the ancient words of Isaiah, written to a people who were living in a time of uncertainty. Words that might be familiar to us in 2025 were at the time unexpected, hope-filled, promising. People who were away from the familiar, in a foreign land, perhaps separated from loved ones, heard that they were not abandoned, there was still reason to hope for what God had planned for the people.

To that end, this time together at First UMC is being acknowledged as Hope in the Midst of Chaos. The words we associate with Advent - peace, hope, joy, and love - will be considered with the very human needs we see in our world... light, housing, water, security. Ancient words that brought hope to exiles, neither shall they learn war any more, he shall decide with equity for the meek of the earth, for waters shall break forth in the wilderness, and streams in the desert, and every valley shall be lifted up, and every mountain and hill be made low will be heard with modern ears and hearts and we will be asked to open ourselves to what Isaiah's words mean today to those who feel exiled. No definition for who that is - each one of us determines where and who we are.

It is holy time, it is joyful time. I encourage you to take full advantage of the many opportunities that are offered in celebration of the season. Volunteer at the Heartland Food Bank on December 9. Visit the Alternative Christmas Mall (December 7, 14, 21) or the Mitten tree (November 23 and 30). Make a donation of coats or to a matching fund. Face that this time of year isn't always easy and come to the Blue Christmas service on December 20. Make a date to enjoy fellowship with church friends. Come to worship and immerse yourself in the music, the sounds, the scriptures, the joy of the season.

It is the end of the year but it is the beginning of something new. The word advent literally means a coming into place or being; arrival. Let's come together with intention and share holy space and time.

RAINBOW FACTORY UPDATE

First United Methodist Church has been home to the Rainbow Factory Preschool since 1965, a dream of church member Norma Lyle who opened 2 days a week for children.

> The program has grown and in action taken by the Preschool Board has applied for and been granted 501c3 status. Some things will change, some things won't.

The Preschool Board sought this autonomy in order to be eligible for grants that were affected by the

church's available funds. And while there is autonomy there will still be a connection between the two entities.

The members of the Board are working toward a December 31 date to be autonomous. The work continues between our two groups. Members of the church serving on the board are Carol Beaty, Alan Dappen, Marie Meyers, and Nancy Rosenow.



STAFF CHANGE and AN INVITATION

As you know by now, in the month of November we received the resignation of our Minister of Education, Elizabeth Emis. We are grateful for the ways Liz shared her creativity and passion for ministry with the children, youth, and families of our congregation and beyond. We wish her well in her future endeavors and pray for her and her family, spouse John, and sons Jackson and Will.

There have been questions about her departure, and that requires some education about United Methodist deacons and elders. Elders are ordained to word, order, sacrament, and service. They are appointed by a bishop to their ministry settings. Deacons are ordained to word and service. They are responsible to find employment and a bishop approves that as a ministry appointment. Deacons serve in churches, in ministries beyond the local church, some teach, some are administrators, musicians, some preach. Their appointment year may not echo the schedule of elders who are appointed July 1 - June 30.

At Annual Conference this year Liz was commissioned as a provisional deacon, a designation that she retains. She continues in the process toward ordination and we will pray for her in that journey as well.

Our Staff Parish Relations Committee is working to hone a job description. In the meantime our dedicated Sunday School teachers, our choir directors, and our Wednesday night volunteers are still working with our children. Nebraska Community Blood Bank

Our Nebraska Community Blood Drive was a SUCCESS!

A big THANK YOU to those who donated blood at the blood drive we had on November 9. We were able to collect 24 units which in turn helped save 72 lives!

We were so excited to partner this year with the Nebraska Community Blood Bank that provides blood to over 23 healthcare facilities throughout eastern Nebraska and western lowa. As the local supplier to the Omaha metropolitan area, their blood donors help ensure nearby hospitals are stocked and ready to serve patients in need.

The need is constant. There is no substitute for blood. Blood components cannot be synthetically made and can only come from volunteer donors. It's the blood on the shelves today that saves lives which is why donors are needed to give regularly so that there is enough blood when a disaster or crisis occurs.

Some interesting facts about donating:

- Every 2 seconds someone needs blood
- 62% of the U.S. is eligible to donate blood, yet only about 3% do so.
- More than 25% of the blood supply is used by cancer patients.
- More than 15 million units of blood products are transfused in the U.S. every year.
- 1 out of 3 people will need blood in their lifetime.
- The #1 reason people don't donate is they were never asked!

So, take this as your personal invitation to donate when we have our next drive in the spring!!



VOLUNTEER OPPORTUNITY WITH AARP

The AARP TaxAide program is a free service that helps people file their income tax returns and is operated by the AARP Foundation in cooperation with the IRS.



TaxAide started in 1968 with just four volunteers and in 2024 there were over 3500 Methodist Church.

Accomplishing all this work requires a variety of roles in addition to the Counselors who prepare returns at a faceto-face site or using a virtual system. These roles include: Client Facilitators; Technology Coordinators; Communications Coordinators; and Leadership and Administrative volunteers. Bilingual speakers are in great demand to assist volunteers in all roles. Training for Counselors is available online for volunteers after being registered through the portal (see below). In-person training for all new volunteers will be held at First United Methodist beginning in December. Additional classes will be held in January in preparation for sites to open in February.

Dear Friends, the Finance Committee has been working hard on the 2026 budget and the Stewardship Campaign (thank you Kevin and Paige Wycoff for your leadership). We are doing well financially but we really need your help, so please get your pledges in soon. And if you can, please increase your pledge by 10% this year. You have a chance to review and approve the 2026 budget at the Church Council meeting on January 6, 2026. Please plan to attend if you can.

October marks 83.3% of the calendar year. Our revenues were \$920,557, or 94.5% of our budget. Expenses were \$830,804, or 85.3% of budget. We have also collected 97.5% of our total pledges for the year.
